HSRP-VI Year II Highlights—Part II

Notable Tidbits:

- The Human Services Research Partnership: Virgin Islands (HSRP-VI) has a Memorandum of Cooperative Agreement with the V.I. Department of Human Services.
- The Partnership roster has included current and former Head Start and Temporary Assistance to Needy Families clients.
- Members of the Core Research Team attended the culminating activity of the Human Services Research Partnership: Puerto Rico and met the research team. The USVI group received four publications the accomplishments of the HSRP-PR.

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THE RESEARCH PARTNERSHIP: Year II of the Human Services Research Partnership: US Virgin Islands (HSRP-VI) was an eventful one! In the second half of Year II, the Research Partnership continued to be engaged. Because of the need to actively engage Partners during the completion of the Environmental Scan research project, Partners came together once in the third guarter and twice in the fourth guar-

ter of Year II. In the 3rd quarter meeting, work began on identifying three HS/EHS issues and three TANF Issues that could be further explored to improve program delivery and outcomes. The two meetings in the 4th quarter provided further opportunities for Partners, working with the Core Research Team and consultants to further stream-line priority issues into working research questions for further exploration. There was also a training session for Partners focused on reaffirming the CBPR principles guiding the Partnership's work and clarifying Partner engagement in the research process.


RESEARCH ACTIVITY: The HSRP-VI completed data collection activities in support of the an environmental scan study. Presentations were made in Partnership meetings sharing key findings related to the HS/EHS and TANF programs. The presentations served as the springboard for Partners' identification of priority programmatic issues for translation to research questions.

COMMUNICATION, ENGAGEMENT, & DISSEMINATION: There was significant activity in this area in the second half of Year II. First, the project's microsite was updated with an updated Project Fact Sheet highlighting key project activities. Copies of this Fact Sheet were shared with HS/EHS and TANF clients. Additionally, an updated listing of Partners and Associates was added to the project's microsite, along with photographs and brief biographies of the project's Core Leadership Team. Finally, ACF's Fall 2016 newsletter, CURRENTS, highlighted the Core Team's meeting with then ACF Acting Assistant Secretary Mark Greenberg and Regional Administrator Joyce Thomas.

HSRP-VI RECOVERING RESEARCH POST-HURRICANE IRMA AND

As we prepare for another hurricane season, it is a time to reflect on what we have accomplished since our last newsletter. Although we continue to share office space and like everyone else are still challenged with intermittent power outages, telephone disruptions and internet access, we have still managed to move forward with our research agenda.

Two of our research projects had to be postponed but we have developed two new proposals to address issues arising out of our recent disasters. The first project will look at Head Start/Early Head Start (HS/EHS) and will examine the needs of parents, teachers and other staff to determine the impact of the hurricanes on their lives and on service delivery. Our other goal is to build program resilience by determining what policies and procedures can be implemented in the event of another disaster. The second research proposal will look at the impact of the hurricanes on TANF staff, clients, and other organizations that work with the TANF program.

As with the HS/EHS program we will be assessing the impact of the hurricane and the policies and procedures that can be used in the event of future disruptions in the U.S. Virgin Islands. As we enter the upcoming hurricane season **Promising Practices** recommended by SAMHSA provide a useful strategy we can adapt and employ. We will PREPARE for any eventuality; RE-SPOND to the research needs in the community even as we RECOVER; and we endeavor to use the findings from our research to INFORM decision making and ASSIST our partners and stakeholders in the Territory.
