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Alumni Remember UVI at 51st Charter Day

A s a student attending the .University of the Virgin Islands, do you remember your days being carefree or do you remember an endless stream of deadlines and papers? UVI alumnus Kwesi Howard '01, remembers both. Howard was one of three alumni panelist who shared their UVI experiences at UVI's 51st Charter Day ceremony in March. Now a deputy U.S. marshal, Howard was nicely dressed in a suit and tie, at the event held in the Administration and Conference Center. A sharp contrast to the basketball jersey he wore as a member of UVI's basketball team.

Howard said when he entered UVI he had no idea what he wanted to do for a living. "I had terrible study habits," he said. "I would come to class and shoot from the hip. I guess I had good genes. I passed the tests." Howard remembered initially going to a lot of parties and even participating in balloon fights on

campus, but he also remembered that he was challenged with exams and lengthy term papers. "I see challenges as opportunities for growth and UVI will challenge you," said Howard. thinking that he would breeze through UVI as he had high school, but found that UVI had extremely high academic standards. "There was a large population of students from other Caribbean islands including, St. Kitts, Anguilla, St. Martin and Tortola, that were very intelligent. "Those guys were on top of their game," said Vialet, who attended classes on UVI's St. Thomas campus. "We realized quickly that we also had to be on top of our game." He said UVI professors were adamant that he focus on his education and UVI helped to improve his character. "The most important thing that UVI taught me was discipline," said Vialet.

Memories of UVI's caring faculty caused Sanchez to breakout in tears. "The professors genuinely care about you as a student and you don't see that other places," she said. "It is a community that you feel comfortable in and that helps you grow stronger. UVI can build you up to do great things. Whatever your goal is I am confident that UVI can build you." Sanchez participated in UVI's dual degree engineering program that allowed her to spend three years at UVI and two years at Columbia University - earning degrees from both institutions.

UVI's Charter Day celebration was held to celebrate its charter by the Fourth Legislature of the Virgin Islands on March 16, 1962.



For the past three years, Marthious Clavier '02, '09 has served on the UVI Board of Trustees. Clavier, also a UVI employee, will step down from his post as alumni representative at the end of Spring 2013. "I've been truly honored to serve as the Alumni Trustee," he said.

Clavier added, "Though the position is the alumni trustee, the incoming trustee should function as a trustee and thus make decisions on what is best for the University, and not just for one particular stakeholder group." He also suggested the new trustee get a wellrounded experience. "He or she should attend as many functions at the University as possible," he said. "In doing this, he or she will have a better chance at being connected to what is happening at the University." He added, "Above all, the incoming trustee should remember the mission of the University and align their thinking to further the mission."


Husbands has always been actively involved in the community.
